

The **HEAT** is ON in the GARDEN

Many species are expanding their natural range, heading further north in a warming climate. Some are becoming familiar garden visitors, but not all are welcome. Here are just a few to look out for:



Box Moth - *Cydalima perspectalis*
first recorded in Britain in 2007,
can now be found across the country



Southern Box Psyllid -
Spanioneura fonscolombii
was uncommon in southern England
but now found further north



Lily Beetle - *Lilioceris lili*
first recorded in southern Britain in early 1900s
but has become widespread since 1990s



False Widow Spider -
Steatoda nobilis
introduced to southern England
in late 1800s but has recently
spread further north



Black Vine Weevil -
Otiorhynchus sulcatus
native to UK (?), now very common



Girdled Snail - *Hygromia cinctella*
introduced to Britain in 1950s,
now widespread and increasing



Worm Slug - *Boettgerilla pallens*
first noted in Britain in 1972,
now found across the country



Australian Flat-worm - *Australplana sanguinea*
recorded on Isles of Scilly in 1980s,
now widespread in southern England
